The combined efforts of the second and third-year students ensured the event was a grand success, making the freshers feel truly welcomed and celebrated.




At the start of the even semester of the academic year 2024-2025, the TY Psychology students presented an insightful overview of their internship experiences, showcasing their growth across various fields:
