

Terence Lewis is an Indian dancer and choreographer who specializes in contemporary dance. He is known as a choreographer and judge in reality dance series - Dance India Dance. He runs his 'Terence Lewis Contemporary Dance Company' in Mumbai. He holds dance workshops both in India and abroad. He has choreographed Bollywood films like, Lagaan (2001), Jhankaar Beats (2003) and Naach (2004). He has also choreographed musicals, stage shows, ads, music videos and national and international dance competitions.



Born on April 10, 1975 and raised in Mumbai in a Catholic family of Xavier Lewis and Teresa Lewis, Terence is the youngest of eight siblings. His love for dancing started at age six when his teacher asked him to participate in a dance competition. He received the

first prize for his three-minute act and this got him addicted to the stage. He studied and started dancing in St. Theresa high school Bandra (Mumbai). He enrolled at the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and the Martha Graham Center of Contemporary Dance in New York and trained in jazz, ballet and contemporary dance.

Terence has choreographed a number of films and musicals, stage shows, Indian contemporary performances, Bollywood Shows, corporate launches, Broadway West-end musicals, feature films and several popular music videos. He received the Staar Parivaar Award for Favorite Judge. He also won the 2002 American Choreography Award for his choreography for songs of the movie Lagaan along with Saroj Khan. Terence is the first Indian to receive the danceWEB Europe Scholarship, representing India in Vienna, Austria. ***



DIPA KARMAKAR: INDIA'S FIRST OLYMPIC GYMNAST

Margao, 16 August: As Shobhaa De ridicules the Indian Olympic team by posting discouraging tweets, India's very own Dipa Karmakar makes history - being the first Indian woman, after 52 years, to qualify for the Olympic womens gymnastics



competition and securing the 4th place at the finals of the Rio Olympics 2016. Dipa is one of the only five women who have

successfully landed the Produnova, the most difficult vault currently performed in womens gymnastics, but sadly it wasn't enough to win her the gold medal. India being a country dominated by cricket, Dipa Karmakar made heads turn to watch her perform at the Olympics 2016 with the hope that India might get its first Olympic medal of this year. Dipa, now 23, still eyes a medal at the 2020 Toronto Olympics, while her coach believes age is just a number and knows that she won't rest until she wins. Dipa Karmakar has forced us to realize that we cannot be a country of cricket or football alone, but a country with different kinds of sports with dedicated sportsmen striving hard to bring pride to the nation. Karmakar now aims at winning the world cup in Hungary and continue her training after she reaches India from Rio. Karmakar

now stands as an inspiration to millions of Indians who are in awe and praise of her hard work and dedication after the Rio Olympics 2016. She may not have won the medal, but she has surely won the hearts of millions.



To Park Or Not To Park








Letters Unposted
