

Aether contains the work output of the students of the Writing for the Media course. We are in our Fifth Year! But a long way before we can rest easy.















The protests against CAA & NRC began on the 4th of December, 2019. The students of JNU in Delhi collectively raised their voices against this bill because of the unconstitutional nature of the bill, which is now an Act. According to this bill, Muslim immigrants will not be granted citizenship in India. It's important to note here that since this bill has surfaced, all political leaders except for Mamata Banerjee have mostly kept silent. The Supreme Court has not granted a stay order on this bill, let alone hear the many petitions made against it. Students of JNU, Jamia Millia Islamia, Aligarh Muslim University and TISS have been at the forefront of the protests, amongst some others; in the present scenario, they are doing the job of the opposition. In spite of ardent protests, our Home Minister, Mr. Amit Shah has repeatedly said that CAA will not be revoked. A question now arises, 'Why are students the only opposition?' Our politicians have gone considerably silent and

some claim that this is because the government is blaming them of 'appeasing the minorities'. However, there is no conclusive reason as to why the leaders from the opposition are silent. The Act tries to divide the nation on religious lines and the NRC states that all the people who do not possess documents to prove their national identity are considered immigrants despite being born and raised in India. A while ago, CPI Leader Kanhaiya Kumar had said this, "Yeh Hindu, Musalman nahi balki Hindustan ka sawaal hai" (It's not about Hindus or Muslims; It's about India). The students are being the opposition because this Act is challenging the very national identity of an Indian and in doing so, challenging the Constitution itself. Granted some politicians did participate in the protests and indeed, the Congress did organise a meeting with an anti-CAA & NRC agenda but their actions seem to bear no consequence. It appears as if the student protests will decide, to a large degree, the further standing on this situation and the opposition parties would benefit from this.

WHY ARE YOUNG PEOPLE PROTESTING AGAINST THE CITIZENSHIP AMENDMENT ACT?

The Citizenship Amendment Act protests also known as the CAA and NRC protests, are a series of ongoing protests across the country against the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) which was enacted into law on 12 December 2019, and against proposals to enact a nationwide National Register of Citizens (NRC). The protests began in the North Eastern states of the country but now almost every state of India is protesting either against or in favour of the Act. Protesters throughout India, see the new law as discriminating against Muslims and as unconstitutional; they are demanding the amendment to be scrapped and the nationwide NRC not to be implemented. The majority of the questions as to why are the youth actively protesting against this Act is being asked largely by all those Uncles and Aunties who have read this stuff on WhatsApp. Nevertheless, these questions need to be answered. Firstly, the most common question being asked is, "Why are you protesting? This has nothing to do with you, it has nothing to do with your citizenship, it's about immigrants, why can't you leave it alone?" The simple answer is that it has to do with my country, and therefore it has to do with me. Just because something does not affect me directly, does not mean I should not pay attention to the changes the government is bringing in. More importantly, this is a citizenship law based

on religion in my country. And therefore it is my concern. Secondly, "Why are the students and the youth of this country affected?" The students can understand the gravity of the events occurring throughout the country. They know that if they do not speak up and raise awareness, nobody will pay attention to the tricks that the government is playing on us. They know that the future of the nation is in their hands and that they must not be silent. Over 20 universities are out on the streets at this point, there's violence all over the country and at this point, not a single press conference has helped the government to answer the questions that have been asked or even provide any sort of clarification or solution. The government must communicate to us through official sources. Not through forwards or leaked information to the press but through actual, formal information. Because at the end of the day, all elected governments are answerable to the people. Even if you have passed a law through both the houses of Parliament, when the people ask you question, you must answer.

50 states, 9.8 million km2, population over 328 million and an impeachment trial during an election year, a president who might impeached living his best life, World War 3 on the brink; that's the United States of America in a nutshell at the moment. Donald J. Trump, along with his never-ending controversies are at the helm of affairs amidst an Impeachment scandal that could put him in the very exclusive club of impeached Presidents along with Andrew Johnson and Bill Clinton who were both impeached on 24 February 1868 and on 19 December 1998 respectively. If the House votes to impeach Trump, he will become only the third President in the history of the United States of America to be impeached.

Before we go into all the juicy bits, let's clear any doubts about impeachment one might have. Simply put, Impeachment in the US refers to the process that allows senior figures in the government to hold other officials (like judges, the President and Cabinet members) to account if they're suspected of committing offences while in office. These offences include "treason, bribery or other high crimes and misdemeanors". After someone is impeached, they then go on trial in the Senate, the upper house of Congress, and its members decide whether they guilty or not. It's a political trial, not a criminal one.

20 January 2017 was a day very few people saw coming. Heck, Donald Trump himself did not see it coming. Fast forward three years later and Trump has found himself immersed in so many controversies that at this point keeping track is not an option. Trump faces two articles of Impeachment, the first charge being that he is accused of seeking help from Ukraine's government to help him get re-elected this November and to get some dirt on his rivals. He

allegedly held back millions of dollars of military aid to Ukraine and suspended a proposed meeting with Ukraine's President at the White House.

In exchange, witnesses have revealed that Donald Trump wanted Ukraine to publicly announce an investigation into the man who's leading the Democratic race to challenge him in the upcoming election, Joe Biden. This move may have resulted from the fact that according to the polls, Joe Biden would beat him if chosen as the Democratic candidate. The second charge Trump faces is the accusation that he obstructed Congress, after the White House refused to allow staff to testify at the first impeachment hearing last year.

It all started in August of 2019 when a whistle-blower made allegations against Donald Trump. An investigation followed and in December the democratic leaders from the House voted to impeach Trump. In January this year, the case was passed up to the Senate where the trial is underway. That's all for the impeachment trial for now folks!

After the House presents the articles of Impeachment to the Senate, it remains in session every day except on Sundays. In mean time, all the senators running for president must leave their campaigns behind for the rest of the trial. The trial will likely last for weeks. The major part of event was unknown to me, which included the names of people who planned this event. So the first task I undertook was to approach that one friend who had contacts with everyone. An ideal person that fitted this definition for me was Bakhita Afonso from the Sociology and Psychology department. She was part of the student's council last year and asking her would have been a good option for further investigation and inquiry. Just as I expected she handed me a list of names and contact numbers belonging to the members. I immediately tried to get in touch with them via Whatsapp and finalised a meeting point. Sadly couldn't meet most of them, but successfully reached out to two of the members; Neha A. Pai Dukle (Psychology) the environmental secretary and Sindiya Shivanand Faldessai (Physics) General Secretary.

My first priority was to know the exact list of events that took place on each day of the fun week. So

according to them, each day had a different theme going on and the students dressed up according to the given theme. The first day, that is the 18th of December 2019, was themed Retro. Judging from the pictures provided by the council members, the event looked bright and received a good reaction from the students. There were competitions like 'wealth out of waste' and 'poetry writing and recitation competition'. The 'dance battle' was the cherry on the cake for the first day. Small entertaining activities like 'fish ponds, ramp walks and flash mobs were also conducted. Facilities like music added excitement to the event and created a celebratory mood. But this left me with a small number of people I can question and compact space to work with.

I asked them if they consider the event to be a success. "yes, the event was successful. Some students even texted back saying that they enjoyed a lot." Neha responded in a genuine manner.

I asked them if the event had missed out on something and what changes could have resulted in a better response. They said that more funds would have changed the look of the event and would have created an opportunity to have even more engaging activities. Student participation was low compared to what they anticipated and would have hyped the event up if more people got involved. They suggested that for future events like fun fest, planning should be done well in advance and that preparations should start as early as possible. Proper budget and time management would create an evident difference.

Now that I had witnessed the perspective of the organizers, I thought of acquiring an honest opinion from the students. I rushed through the list of students who actively participated in the event. I got in touch with a few students, who decided to remain anonymous, but provided good amount of information. They said the event as a whole was great. Fashion show and the dance competition were visually pleasing; the fish pond was very exciting and finally the DJ night was the best part of the event.

They also pointed out the drawbacks of the event, which were also acknowledged by the council members. They said that student involvement was very small and felt that informing them about the event a little earlier would have brought about a positive feedback. They also commented that the themes were very common and called them 'the usual concepts'. They suggested that inter departmental competitions would also result in active participation of the students and increase the team spirit of the students.

After listening to the audiences' perspective, I was of an opinion that the council members had done a good job in organizing the event.





